

Bantu knots owe their name to the Bantu people, indigenous to various regions across Africa.


ATSIFIFI (AFRICAN HAIR THREADING)

Braiding patterns were used to identify tribe, age, wealth, marital status and religion.


MPESE (FREEFORM LOCS)


These symbolize freedom from established norms, a shaking off of what doesn't feel true to oneself.





